**HUNSTEIN**, Chief Justice.

This appeal involves a constitutional challenge to the 2008 Georgia Charter Schools Commission Act, OCGA § 20-2-2081 et seq. (the "Act"). Appellants/plaintiffs are local school systems whose 2009 and 2010 complaints were consolidated by the trial court; appellees/defendants are former State

School Superintendent Kathy Cox (in her official capacity), the Georgia Charter Schools Commission, its chairperson and members (in their official capacities), the Georgia Department of Education, and the first three schools chartered under the Act. Appellants contend, inter alia, that the Act is unconstitutional because it violates the "special schools" provision in the Georgia Constitution of 1983.

See Art. VIII, Sec. V, Par. VII (a). Because our constitution embodies the fundamental principle of exclusive local control of general primary and secondary ("K-12") public education and the Act clearly and palpably violates Art. VIII, Sec. V, Par. VII (a) by authorizing a State commission to establish competing State-created general K-12 schools under the guise of being "special schools," we reverse.

In 2001, my oldest daughter's mother, Mrs. Kimberly Brock, submitted paperwork to the Virginia Child Support Enforcement Division for us to establish a child support payment schedule. In the subsequent proceedings, we agreed upon a monthly child support amount that I consistently paid. Even prior to this action, I had consistently paid monthly child support to Mrs. Brock.
